

# Jews for Jesus to be in Colby

What do the Jewish Passover and Jesus' Last Supper have in common?

Larry Dubin, speaking on behalf of Jews for Jesus, will answer that question in a presentation called "Christ in the Passover" 7 p.m. March 30 at Colby Wesleyan Church, 320 W. Pine.

He will share insights on how the pieces of God's plan of salvation fit together, in a visual display of the Passover.

Using a visual display of traditional Passover accouterments, the "Christ in the Passover" presentation enhances the Christian's understanding and appreciation of the Jewish background of the Christian Communion. Ancient and modern Jewish customs are discussed and

described with an emphasis on the aspect of redemption which Christ accomplished at Calvary.

Dr. Moishe Rosen, founder of Jews for Jesus, contends that some of the most important elements of Christian doctrine, such as the Trinity, the principle of substitutionary atonement and salvation through a personal relationship with the Messiah, are implied in the Seder (Passover feast) as observed by Orthodox Jews even today.

The Christ in the Passover presentation is one way Jews for Jesus can help churches appreciate the Jewish roots of the Christian faith.

# Senator supports comment on gays

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican presidential candidate Sam Brownback is backing the Pentagon's top general over his remarks that homosexual acts are immoral.

The Kansas senator planned to send a letter on Thursday to President Bush supporting Marine Gen. Peter Pace, who earlier this week likened homosexuality to adultery and said the military should not condone it by allowing gay personnel to serve openly.

The chairman of the Joint Chiefs also said in an interview with the Chicago Tribune: "I believe that homosexual acts between individuals are immoral and that we should not condone immoral acts. I do not believe the United States is well-served by a policy that says it is OK to be immoral in any way."

Lawmakers of both parties criticized the remarks, but Brownback's letter called the criticism "both unfair and unfortunate."

"We should not expect someone as qualified, accomplished and articulate as General Pace to lack personal views on important moral issues," Brownback said. "In fact, we should expect that anyone entrusted with such great responsibility will have strong moral views."

"People should not be judged based on their sexual orientation," the New Mexico Governor said in Santa Fe. "Throughout my entire career I have fought for equal rights and against discrimination of any kind."

While there is no indication that Pace's job is in jeopardy, Brownback's letter to Bush said "personal moral beliefs" should not disqualify anyone from a position of leadership in the U.S. military.

"General Pace's recent remarks do not deserve the criticism they have received," the letter said. "In fact, we applaud General Pace for maintaining a personal commitment to moral principles."

Pace said he supports "don't ask, don't tell," something Brownback said is "an appropriate policy."

Brownback, a favorite of the religious right, has been a prominent opponent of gay marriage.

Brownback spokesman Brian Hart said the senator was working Thursday to get other lawmakers to sign his letter. Hart said Brownback's office would not disclose who has signed on to the letter until there is "a final count."

On his campaign bus in Iowa on Thursday, Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., declined to comment when asked whether he agreed with Gen. Peter Pace's comment that homosexuality was immoral. He said he still backs the military's "don't ask, don't tell" policy. "It's working."

Another Republican candidate, former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney, who has been criticized for changing his views on gay rights to conform with conservative views, said he thought Pace's comments were "inappropriate for public discourse."

"He can believe what he wants to, that's the great thing about America — believe in what you want. But in a governmental setting, the right way to go is to show more of an outpouring of tolerance," Romney said on CNN's "Larry King Live."

He said he didn't think the "don't ask, don't tell policy" made a lot of sense, but added he wouldn't change it now.

# Do I have anger issues or something else?

Anger is not a bad thing if you maintain control.

Master your faculties and anger will strengthen your resolve.

Surrender to anger and he will restrict you like an anaconda.

Do I have anger issues? Stop. Before you answer let me explain something. Anger alone could be an adversary or a friend. When you couple anger with issues it becomes an adversary, creating a whole new ball game.

Anger alone is defined as: a feeling of strong displeasure in response to an assumed injury. This can be used to benefit you by creating stronger motivation to succeed. Emotional bumps and bruises are conducive to developing maturity. Remember you are dealing with an assumed injury.

Issues are a different matter and demand attention. When they present themselves with anger you get: annoyance, resentment, indignation, fury, rage, and wrath. Any one of these has the ability to choke the life out of you.

Anger is not an easy topic to discuss, but can you name anyone immune from its infectious ways? Me

neither. So walk with me just a minute as we examine the fellows connected to anger seeking opportunity in our lives.

Each of the following has identifying characteristics which embody their purpose. Annoyance is a feeling of irritation, milder or more fleeting than anger. You can get over it, but do you really want to?

Resentment is subdued anger caused by a sense of unfair treatment, and a powerlessness to remedy this. Now this issue is creating personality traits to diminish your strength among your peers.

Indignation is anger based on a condemnation of something considered wrong or unfair. This one pushes you into a corner, forcing you to disconnect from others out of guilt.

Fury is an intense form of anger that suggests lack of control and potential to do violence. He is an agitator convincing you its OK to

release your pent up frustration.

Rage is violent anger, more intense than fury. This one understands boiling point and controls your pressure valve, convincing you to release steam or explode. Wrath is a literary or formal term for strong anger, often with overtones of a desire for revenge. This one is mentioned most in the Bible and identifies the head of the serpent, because once he bites you, game over. His intent is to swallow your life and control your destiny.

Trust me; no one will care if you're upset as long as you maintain control. Lose control and listen to an issue wanting you to retaliate, and most people will build defenses ready to strike first if necessary. Anger does not have a particular age group targeted for destruction. The Bible says, God calls the young because they're strong, the old because they're wise. Perhaps Anger Issues do the same thing. Think about it. Young people filled with rage are unholy terrors to deal with in society. Old folks could never inflict the same amount of damage. However, a senior master mind with criminal intent is a lethal combination and very difficult to

catch and stop.

Psychiatrists and psychologists were never meant to cure the presence of anger in a person. The result of their involvement is to identify the behavior brought on by issues and treat the symptoms to control/suppress the thing within. The Bible says, Be angry but sin not. Don't let the sun go down upon your wrath. Don't carry into the night what got started in the day. Anger must not be an open door for issues to enter our lives. Only the Creator knows how to keep the vessel clean, when we can't do it ourselves.
