March is ‘Save Your Vision Month’

Kansas residents are lacking in critical information that can help preserve and protect the eyesight of children and adults, according to survey information collected by the American Optometric Association.

Survey results indicate that the eyesight of children is particularly at risk because of this knowledge deficit.

The association dedicates the month of March to raising Americans’ awareness of the importance of regular eye care. In honor of Save Your Vision Month, a new, interactive, Web-based version of the American Eye-Q survey is available online at www.aoa.org. Individuals are encouraged to test their eye care knowledge and compare their answers with those of other respondents.

Annual eye exams are recommended beginning at age 60, when age-related eye problems increasingly begin to factor into a person’s overall health.

In honor of Save Your Vision Month, the Kansas Optometric Association would like to remind Kansans to take the following measures to preserve their eye health:

1. Go see the doctor: See an optometrist or ophthalmologist for regular, comprehensive, dilated eye exams.
2. Wear those shades: Both adults and children should wear sunglasses year-round with UV-A and UV-B protection.
3. Have your eye exam and learn about your overall health: Comprehensive eye exams may detect diseases such as diabetes, hypertension and even multiple sclerosis.
4. Watch that diet: Eat green, leafy vegetables to protect eyes from disease.
5. Take care of your baby’s eyes: Schedule your infant’s first eye exam from 6 to 12 months of age.
6. Remember that your children’s eyes change as they grow. Schedule a free vision assessment for your three-year-old with a participating optometrist through the See To Learn Program by calling 800-960-EYES.
7. Know when to apply makeup: Always put contacts in eyes before applying eye makeup.
8. Contact lenses are only safe if prescribed by an eye doctor: Never wear contacts without a prescription.
