The course is designed for licensed practical nurses and for registered nurses needing a refresher course in IV therapy, said Mary Herbel, coordinator.

The class will meet Monday through Friday, June 18-22 from 9 a.m.-12 and 1 p.m.-4 p.m. each day in the Health Sciences Building, room #809.

Clinicals will be set the first day of class and will be conducted at a local area hospital.
