Soldier recovers from accident

LEAVENWORTH (AP) - In the three years since a traffic accident made U.S. Army Maj. Ron Upton unable to walk, he has pushed himself to recover. After recently running a marathon, Upton s now training for a triathlon

And by the end of the summer, Upton, 35, will deploy to Iraq.

His accomplishments can be credited to hard work, determination and pain.

"We're not in the Old Testament," said Upton. "You don't just get up out of a chair."

In June, Upton will graduate from the Command and General Staff College in Leavenworth and then move to Fort Hood, Texas, where he will coordinate military police resources in the Fourth Infantry Division. Then, he goes Iraq.

The 12-year Army veteran says his only hesitation about going to war is leaving his wife and 15month-old daughter.

"Being a soldier is not what I do, it's who I am," he said. "It's not a job, it's a way of life for me."

Before he leaves, Upton plans to run, swim and bike in a triathlon Sunday in Olathe. That will come after running in last month's Spirit of St. Louis Marathon.

During that race, he twice passed the scene of the Jan. 25, 2004, crash that changed his life. Upton, his wife, Pam, and several friends had gone to St. Louis to watch a St. Louis Blues hockey game.

The next morning, Upton, who was stationed at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., was running an errand in a taxi when the cab went out of control on icy streets and crashed into a building. Upton remembers little of the accident except that the cab driver, who had a heavy foreign accent, had difficulty communicating with a 911 dispatcher and tried to hand the phone to Upton.

Sebelius message resonates

TOPEKA(AP) — She's been talking about the shortage of National Guard equipment for at least two years. She's written letters, answered reporters' questions, even chatted up the president on a jaunt through the Flint Hills.

But it took a devastating tornado May 4 that leveled Greensburg for people to notice what Gov. Kathleen Sebelius was trying to say. "It's one of my favorite topics,"

Sebelius said last week.

She and other governors have tried to put the issue high on the radar for President Bush and the past two secretaries of defense. The reality is that the more the National Guard is sent to Iraq, Afghanistan and - in the case of Kansas -Kosovo, the more gear sent with the soldiers isn't coming home.

The day after the tornado hit Greensburg, Sebelius said those gaps were evident in recovery ef-

"I don't think there is any question if you are missing trucks, Humvees and helicopters that the response is going to be slower," Sebelius said in Greensburg. "We're going to borrow, beg and steal it from wherever you can."

After her comments and the resulting well-publicized spat with the White House, governors from across the country chimed in their support. And they weren't all Democrats, either.

California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger, a Republican, said the shortage of equipment left states in a precarious position for the next hurricane, wildfire or terrorist attack.

Coincidentally, the United States saw all of those events last week, from the foiled plot on soldiers at Fort Dix, N.J., wildfires near Los Angeles and the season's first tropical storm off the Georgia coast.

"What it takes is the president and the secretary of defense — or Congress — to make sure that any funding effort that goes to fund the troops overseas, that we have the equipment here to protect the people here at home," Sebelius said.

In January, the Government Accountability Office gave a report to a House committee making several recommendations on how the National Guard is used and equipped. Among the findings was that no one is planning for how the National Guard would respond if a disaster involved multiple states.

Also, the report found, the Department of Defense doesn't "routinely measure or report to Congress the equipment readiness of nondeployed National Guard forces for domestic missions." In short, federal officials don't know what they've got until it's gone.

And for most states, more than sity. half of the National Guard's equipment is gone, a problem when they were supplied to only about 60 percent to 70 percent of what they needed before the Iraq war started. The Pentagon has a multiyear plan to replace the equipment.
