Art club learns about impressionist

meeting of the High Plains Art Club to begin, Marj Brown, chairman of the club's "June Art Jubilee," passed out the pictures of the gift basket that will be given away on the last day of June. The picture will be placed on the registration boxes that will be places in the participating businesses. Shoppers can sign up for a chance to win the basket at these businesses all during the month of June. Art displays by art club members will also be in each of these businesses.

Jo Bricker chose to give a program on the life of Edgar Degas as the featured artist of the month. She reported that Degas was born in Paris in 1834 to an upper middle class family, and that he was considered to be one of the more affluent artists of the Impressionist movement.

Bricker said that Degas first studied to be a lawyer, but soon realized that his true love was art. His family reluctantly supported him, and even built him a studio. He first studied to be a classical artist by studying the old masters in Italy for three years.

"After serving in the National Guard in 1870 at the outbreak of the France-Prussian War, he began having eye problems that continued to plague him all of his life, becoming worse as he aged." Bricker added.

After the war, he spent a short time in New Orleans visiting his brother and painted a few family pictures while there. After returning to Paris he held some Impressionist exhibitions between 1874 and 1886. Bricker said that he is most famous for his ballet and horse racing works. The "Little Dancer of Fourteen Years" is his most famous sculpture.

Bricker reported that, "Because Degas came from a more affluent family than most artists of that era,

he was a friend of Manet and Mary Cassette, but because he felt that painters should not have a personal life, he never married." He died in ing of the Artist's Round Table held 1917 a lonely man, and is buried in Montmartre.


Shirley Baker, hostess for the month, served refreshments before the business meeting.
