Spresser told the commissioners the development corporation's board is considering hiring Terry Woodbury to help develop strategies for the future through town hall type meetings.

Woodbury is founder of Kansas Communities, a corporation that capitalizes on his skills in inspiring people to lead and manage their communities. He also helps new organizations get started and is available as a keynote speaker.

Spresser said the board would like Woodbury to visit Sheridan County and meet with leaders from business, government, education and health and human services.
