Television and news stories bring the experience of a disaster directly into our homes, and when such an event is as close to home as the recent tornado that devastated Greensburg, the impact becomes more personal. Even children who live far from the disaster will worry that the same thing could happen where they live, and be particularly sensitive when storm clouds appear, or when sirens are heard. Children as well as adults may have a hard time dealing with the things they see on TV, and what they hear others talking about. Parents may
