

## Former Trojan still scoring points

Daniel Cormier promised more offense this time around and, fortunately for everyone, he delivered.

That's because at this year's U.S. Nationals in April, Cormier defeated Mo Lawal – a friend and former teammate who moved up from the 185 pound division — in a 1-0, 1-0 yawn-fest that went to the clinch in both periods.

Cormier is a former Colby Community College wrestler. He won national championships in 1998 and 1999 at Colby before transferring to Oklahoma State University. The stage was set for a rematch when Lawal won the Challenge Tournament, earning the right to face Cormier who received an au-

tomatic bid to the finals. However, for the first 1:46 of the first period it looked like those in attendance might be lulled to sleep again with another battle of attri-

tion. But that all changed when Lawal hit an electrifying shot and scored the first point of the match on a pushout.

"That lit a fire under me," said Cormier. "Mo set the stage and it was going to be a battle. It was a battle. I'm not going to go the clinch. It was 0-0 late in the period so Mo went 'Daniel, this isn't going to go clinch, clinch' and got a point and set the tone. I knew I was going to have to step up if I was going to be able to compete with him.'

With eight seconds to go in the period, Cormier scored two points on a body lock, making good on his story.

promise of more offense. He won the period, 2-1, and never let Lawal back in the match. He won the second period 1-0 to get the victory. In the second match he did the same, winning 1-0, 1-0 to make his fifth consecutive World Team.

Yet, the Cormier who stepped on at this year's World Team Trials was different from years past. Struggling with his weight at times, the former Oklahoma State All-American wasn't sure he wanted to stay with wrestling through another Olympic cycle.

Competing at the 264.5-pound Las Vegas. division in a tournament earlier this year, Cormier took it upon himself to keep his weight at 227 instead of 235 during competitions. And it was apparent during his two-match series with Lawal that Cormier was hitting his shots as quickly and as cleanly as he has in several years.

"He's not lazy," said Cormier's coach John Smith, who also mentored Cormier at Oklahoma State. "He's far from lazy. He just likes to eat. He comes from Louisiana and he likes spicy food and he likes to eat a lot of it.

"He did a good job over the last three months. He's worked a little bit harder and he has more direction. His work translated to the mat. It's the best I've seen him wrestle in about three years."

Cormier hopes to wrestle better in three months when he attempts to win his first medal at the World Championships.
