Tips for teaching teens money management

• Take her to the family's financial service provider with you so they can see you making deposits and withdrawals as needed.

• Help him open a checking account, possibly with a debit card. Explain how a debit card can be used in place of a check, and, for using either a check or debit card, how to record the amount of the transaction and balance the account regularly.

· Encourage savings for shortterm (a school trip is an example) and long-term (such as a down payment on his or her first car) goals.

 Encourage comparison shopping for purchases and major expenditures. Shopping for an auto loan or insurance also can be an eye-opening experience for teens. • If considering a credit card,

compare card programs and benefits, and ask for a low limit, such as \$250.
