baseball coach Ryan Carter believed 2007 was the year his team was finally going to break through in the post-season. The baseball gods determined otherwise.

Despite having the homefield advantage and 1-0 lead in their first round playoff best-of-three series with #6 seed Fort Scott, the #3 seeded Trojans lost the final much earlier in May than they ex-

"Last year was disappointing," said Carter. "I thought we had as much talent on that team as we've ever had here. I felt we were upset by Fort Scott in that series. They may think otherwise, but I felt we had the firepower to make a run at the end of the season. We weren't playing our best baseball."

Fast forward to this spring, and if the Trojans want to make a run at the junior college World Series they will have to go from a team that underachieved to one that exceeds expectations.

Colby returns only 11 of 35 players from last year, including just one everyday position player (Steve Blankenship) and two pitchers that saw any extended time on the mound.

The Trojans are projected to finish fourth in the Western Division, but as they found out last year, playoff success isn't determined on paper.

While they may be short on experience, Carter said this group can go a long way to redeeming their post-season failure of last season.

"We're picked fourth, but I think we're a legit top two team," said Carter, who is entering his 10th year as the Trojan manager. "We're going through some growing pains, but this team is very best baseball is still to come. This team may have had a little slower start, but I think we can put up better numbers than last year."

The defense and pitching showed signs this weekend of coming around, but early on it has been a struggle.

Through the team's first 16 games, the Trojan staff has an ERA of 5.03. In the field, they've committed 36 errors while their opponents have only 18.

'Our offense is going to be able to keep us in games, but for us to go deep in the post-season we need to play better defense and pitch better," said Carter. "Our pitching and defense has been shaky so far. There's the old expression, 'offense wins games, and pitching and defense win championships. We want to win championships, and our pitching and defense are both capable of improving."

Hornstra's 2.21 ERA is the best on the team right now.

Also off to solid starts have been Max Greve (2-2, 4.47) and Sean Lydon (1-2, 3.86).

With Blankenship, their lone returning starter hurt, the Trojans are still looking for someone to assert themselves as the leader.
