Many of us use gasoline-powered lawn equipment and sometimes keep gasoline on hand. This highly flammable fuel is a part of our everyday lives, so here are some important fire-safety hints for storing gasoline:

• Gasoline can become unstable if it's stored in your power equipment for more than a month, so try buying only what you need and use it up.

• Gas should be stored in a well-ventilated area like a garage or shed — never in the basement or inside your house.

• Keep it away from children and pets, and downslope from your water well, if you have one.

• Also, store and transport gas jewelry box and other small, atonly in plastic or metal containers made for that purpose.

• Always use a spout, so that the gas will not spill when pouring.

• When refilling your gaspowered equipment, allow it to cool down before refueling.


