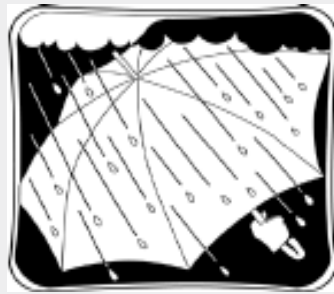


Weather

members honored

Three Goodland High members competed at the International DECA Career Development Conference in Atlanta, then the Goodland clubs recapped their year and gave out awards at the annual Employer/Employee Banquet.

At the conference, senior Jonathan McClung competed in the Quick Serve Restaurant Marketing series competition, which included two problem-solving role plays and a 100-question exam. He didn't place in the top two positions in his section, said club advisor Richard Schwasinger, and did not move on to the final competition.

Junior T.J. Freeman, state DECA western region vice president, competed in the Leadership Education and Development Series and was named an honor graduate.

To be an honor graduate, Schwasinger said, he had to meet all the qualifications and pass a leadership test.

Senior Robert Borneman attended the Senior Management Institute competition and was an honor graduate.

Freeman and Borneman were at the top of their groups, Schwasinger said; there are about five from each state in the event, and the top 10 percent are honor graduates, so about 25 out of 250 get the honor. All went through training to be certified in leadership, he said, and then the top 10 percent received honors.

During the conference, all three Goodland members attended marketing and entrepreneurship seminars. Schwasinger helped with

the Public Relations written event competition and received a "Recognition of Service" certificate.

First- and second-place state winning DECA members from across the United States, Guam, Puerto Rico, Canada, Germany, South Korea and the Virgin Islands competed in series competitions, written events, team events, DECA Quiz Bowl and many leadership development competitions.

At the banquet, the Senior DECA II Chapter thanked everyone who helped the members build their futures by encouraging their projects during the school year. The senior members introduced themselves, their employers, parents and special guests and then the underclassmen did the same.

After the meal, they listed their school activities: school bulletin boards, DECA socials, school announcements and Goodland High campus clean-up and their conferences: Kansas DECA Fall Leadership Development Conference (Rock Springs Ranch), Kansas State DECA Career Development Conference (Overland Park) and International DECA Career Development Conference.

Their community projects were Iowa Township Cemetery Mowing Project, Community Speeches — Goodland City Commissioners, Entrepreneurship Promotion Project, Learn and Earn Project, Public Relations Project, Community Service Project, Goodland DECA Employer-Employee Banquet and participating in the Relay for Life fundraiser for the American Cancer Society.

Fund raisers included pop machine operations, candy machine operations, basketball concessions, Top Side Tip-off basketball and concessions.

KU title boosts local economy

LAWRENCE (AP)- The University of Kansas men's basketball championship did more than just give fans an excuse to party.

City officials said sales tax collections for the late March and early April period have arrived and are 9 percent higher, or \$160,000 greater, than during the same period a year ago.

While some of the increase may be a natural expansion of the city's economy, they said at least part of it can be linked to students, residents and visitors buying more snacks, drinks, T-shirts and other

items as they celebrated the team's national championship run.

"It's definitely more than it would have been otherwise," said city Finance Director Ed Mullins.

City restaurant and bar owners said they certainly saw a difference during the period and took credit for some of the increase to the city's coffers.

"Our sales were over last year's total by a lot," said Doug Holiday, whose Bigg's BBQ restaurant tallied record-setting sales during the tournament.

"And the best news is: I think

it is going to carry over through the summer. I think all this sport's success has really put us on the map. I think there are people who want to come back and check out Lawrence again."

The city will get additional evidence of what the championship meant next month when officials receive its share of taxes collected on alcohol sold at bars and restaurants.

Even without the boost from the Jayhawks' championship, the city's sales tax revenue has been surprisingly strong this year.

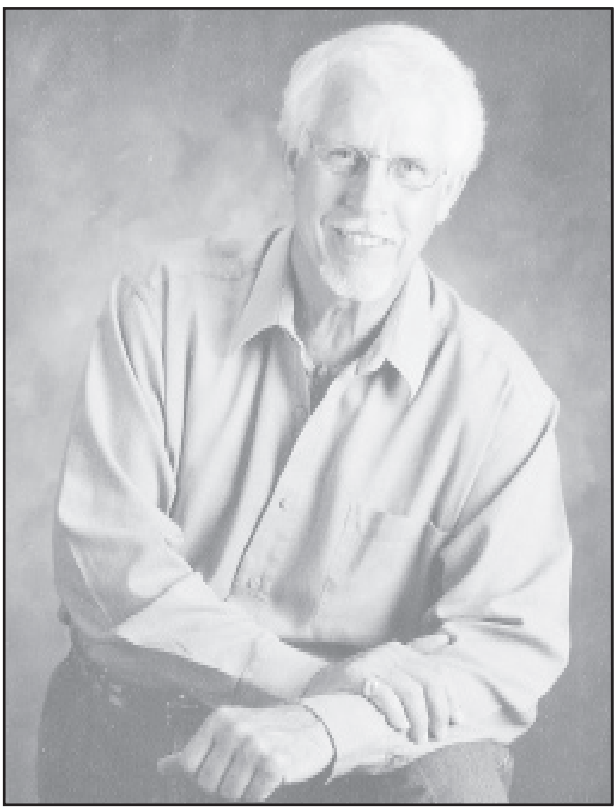
