If you have never been touched by identity theft, you can probably count yourself lucky. You can also probably count on having some sort of incident in your life, whether it is a lost driver's license or massive fraud involving credit cards, personal ID's and more.

Identity theft is a terrible personal violation. You could end up spending an enormous amount of time trying to restore your reputation. And in many cases you will probably end up losing money, possibly significant amounts.

He has discovered that the most essential parts of our personality, from friendliness to flexibility, from openness to originality, can be determined more accurately from our stuff and how we surround ourselves with it than from even our most intimate con-
