Fencing blocks 83

A crew from Colby rushed to Selden today to clean up U.S. 83 after a semitrailer rig loaded with fence panels and stock tanks for Orscheln stores overturned. Terry Cox of Butch's Body Shop (above) surveyed the mess, trying to decide what to move next. His dad, Butch Cox, talked with state Trooper Andy Schippers of Colby (left), who said the driver, Melvo A. Mendoza, 44, Grand Island, Neb., was southbound when his rig went off the right side. He overcorrected, and the trailer overturned across both lanes. Sheridan County deputies and flagmen from the state Department of Transportation directed traffic, through the city park on the northand on the old highway into town to the south. The wreck happened about 8 a.m., he said, adding that the driver told him he may have dozed off. Mendoza was cited for failure to maintain a single lane.

Electrical accident details few

Company officials are still not talking about a power line accident which claimed the life of a utility worker and injured two others just east of Colby on Wednesday.

Jesse Resendiz, marketing communications manager for PAR Electrical Contractors, Inc. of Kansas City, Mo., said until an investigation by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration is completed, few details are being released about the death of Jerrel C. Bingesser, 24, of Council Grove. Bingesser was living in Hoxie at the time of his death. His funeral was Saturday morning in Council Grove.

Reba Reid, communications director for Quanta Services, the parent compant of PAR Electrical Contractors, said the crew on which Bingesser was working was performing routine maintenance on a power pole and were replacing a wood pole about 1 1/2 mile east of Colby when the accident occurred.

Reid said until the federal agency completes its investigation and a report is issued, the names of the two other workers is not being re-

said the federal agency in charge Free Press Reporter of the investigation was on site late last week.

"Occupational Safety and Health Administration has been out and will be back this week to interview me and other crew members," Bokelman said.

PAR crew members working out of Hoxie were back to the equipment site, located abourt one mile west of Hoxie, this morning. Bokelman said if the rain holds off, crews would return to work today.

"If Mother Nature lets us," Bokelman said.

"We will be back at work (today). We have lots of work to do in the Colby area."
