Brisket recipe visited

the brisket recipe that you print- spaghetti and freeze portions in ed? I want to give it a try. — Deb H., via e-mail

Barbecued brisket is a favorite here in Texas. The recipe is my husband David's favorite, and we call it Dilley Digs Brisket. You will need:

1 beef brisket, 8-12 pounds, 2-4 inches thick (not corned beef)

10-20 cloves of garlic, peeled 1/4 cup of all-purpose Greek seasoning (contains 13 spices)

To prepare the beef: Make deep cuts into the brisket with a paring knife and place garlic into the cut. Liberally sprinkle

brisket with Greek seasoning. To cook the meat, you'll need: Outdoor smoker, charcoal, mesquite wood soaked in water till thoroughly wet.

To cook the brisket: smoker, light, and let coals burn till hot and gray.

Place mesquite wood over the charcoal to smother the coals so they smoke (there won't be a flame). Put the brisket, fat side ber of years. (This is an important step.) Put in the oven in arrange blood tests to determine a shallow pan at 250 F for two hours. Remove from the oven and let sit (still wrapped in foil) for 30 minutes to one hour before serving. This allows the meat to "firm up" and the juice to be absorbed. Cut the meat across the grain into thin slices to serve. In San Antonio, brisket and barbecue are served with pinto beans, potato salad, coleslaw, crisp sliced white/ yellow onions, sliced dill hamburger pickles and old-fashioned white bread. -- Heloise

> Immunization Records Dear Heloise: It is an exciting time when our children graduate from high school and leave home for college, marriage, the military or other endeavors. There are many things that we make sure they have, hold and protect, such as their birth certificate, Social Security card and high-school diploma. We often forget to include their immunization record in this list.

Many times, an adult will need to show proof of immunization for college, a job or the military. Typically, the only records that exist are given when the vaccines Pour a pile of charcoal into the are administered, or are in the medical records of the doctor or clinic.

It's important to keep in mind that medical records for youth are maintained for only a limited numto repeat some of the vaccines or immunity. Parents, as your children grow, make sure you know if their doctor participates in an electronic immunization registry. Inclusion in a registry will assure that immunization records are always available. Keep in mind that very few electronic registries existed prior to the mid-1990s, so most current high-school graduates will not have a complete electronic record.
