Allegations in abortion case disturbing, official says

TOPEKA (AP) – Allegations made by abortion provider Dr. disturbing allegations about how George Tiller about how a criminal case against him has been handled are "disturbing," Attorney General Steve Six said Tuesday. But Six wouldn't say much

more. Six's office is pursuing 19 misdemeanor charges against Tiller, who operates a clinic in Wichita and is one of only a few U.S. doctors performing late-term abortions. Tiller's attorneys have asked a district judge in Sedgwick County to either suppress evidence or dismiss the charges because of how the case has been handled.

Immigrant tuition debated

TOPEKA (AP) - A leading opponent of a Kansas law giving some immigrants a break on tuition at state universities and colleges law is encouraged by a ruling by a California appeals court on a similar law there.

Kris Kobach, a law professor at the University of Missouri-Kansas City, said the California ruling casts doubts on the validity of the 2004 Kansas law.

That law allows some illegal immigrants who have graduated from Kansas high schools to qualify for the lower tuition rates normally reserved for Kansas residents. The law requires them to seek legal status.

National groups say Kansas, California and eight other states have similar laws. Supporters argue that they help young people who most likely were brought to the United States by their parents and aren't likely to leave. Critics say such laws endorse illegal immigration and conflict with federal law.

"I think the motion has some some of the case history was developed," Six told reporters.

Tiller's attorneys allege that the case was tainted by questionable conduct by former Attorney General Phill Kline, an anti-abortion Republican, and his staff. They also have questioned the way Paul Morrison, the abortion-rights Democrat who defeated Kline in 2006, handled the case.

"I wouldn't comment specifically on what our response is going to be, other than the office is working on filing a response, which will present our views in court," Six said. "We are going to work on moving forward with the case."

Morrison was forced to resign in January because of a sex scandal, and Six was appointed to replace him.

Kline has said his investigation was legitimate, that judges who have reviewed the evidence have found probable cause to believe crimes were committed and claims that Tiller's attorneys believe the doctor is above the law.

The attorney general's office alleges that Tiller broke a 1998 state law requiring that a second, independent Kansas physician sign off on most late-term abortions. Tiller's attorneys have said he committed no wrong.
