## Radio manager to head north

Colby Free Press aheintz@nwkansas.com By next week, Mike Fell, general manager of KXXX and KQLS radio here the last 4 1/2 years, will be heading back to his native Nebraska with Colby in his rearview mir-

Fell has accepted a job running radio stations in Alliance and Chadron, Neb., for Eagle Broadcasting out of Hays. Fell, an Omaha native, grew up in Nebraska.

"It's been 10 years since I left Nebraska, and I'm happy to be going back there," he said. "It will be an exciting challenge." In Nebraska, he'll be respon-

sible for five stations, KCNB-FM, KCOW-AM and KHAQ-FM in Alliance, and KCNB-FM and KQSK-FM in Chadron. He will be doing his final broad-

cast for KXXX on Sunday, though he will be in and out over the next few weeks, helping with the transition in management. The station's owner, Rocking M Broadcasting out of Manhattan, is looking for a new manager here, he said. While he is excited about return-

ing to the state he grew up in, Fell said he has countless memories about the good times he had broadcasting in Colby. He said one of his most memo-

rable moments was being able to cover all the Western Kansas Liberty League basketball tournament games on the Colby and Goodland stations for the first time in 2006. "I dreamed about doing it and we

did it," Fell said. "I was really proud of that."

He said he wanted to thank Rich Epp, an independent broadcaster who now appears on Colby Community College radio station KTTC; Terry Ostmeyer, athletic director at Wheatland High School in Grinnell, tornado outbreak in May.

and Marty Melia, general manager of the Goodland radio stations, for making that coverage possible.

Another memorable day for Fell was when the Wallace County High boys defeated Brewer in double overtime in the Liberty League basketball finals in 2007.

Fell said it was the greatest game he had a chance to cover while broadcasting in northwest Kansas.

Other memorable moments for Fell include when the Oakley and Colby girls won state basketball championships in 2007, and when this year's Colby Eagles football team made the state playoffs.

He said his all-time favorite team to cover was the 2005 Hoxie Indians girls' basketball team. The Lady Indians team that year, lead by J.C. Hoyt and Dani Pratt, finished 25-1.

"That team played some killer defense," he said.

Four members of a Colorado family escaped serious injury about 8:45 a.m. today when the pickup they were in slipped on an icy bridge west of town on Interstate 70 and flipped into the north

Trooper Andy Schippers of the Kansas Highway Patrol said then driver, Rose Maria Garcia, 41, Pierce, Colo., was westbound in a 1990 Ford Ranger pickup when she hit some ice on the bridge at the U.S. 24 interchange south of

The truck left the road just west of the bridge, he said, and rolled, coming to rest on its side facing

The driver, her husband and their two daughters were all out of the truck by the time help arrived. All four were taken by a Thomas County ambulance to Citizens Medical Center to be checked for injuries.

The family included Garcia, her husband, Magdaleno Garcia, 41, and daughters Jennifer Garcia, 16, and Beatriz Garcia, 13.
