

HOT COCOA

Dear Heloise: How can I get your recipe for hot cocoa? I used to make it for my children years ago, and my daughter told me that no hot cocoa tastes as good as that did, and she would like to make it for her children. Could you help me, please? - Kathyrn Jenkins, via e-mail

Of course I can, and I enjoy knowing that one of my recipes is being passed from one generation to the next. To make it you'll need:

2 cups of powdered milk

Dash of salt

1/4 cup of cocoa

1 cup of powdered sugar

Combine ingredients well and put in a pretty container. Label it with the following directions: Put approximately 4 tablespoons into a cup and fill with 8 ounces of boiling water. Add more of add about 1/3 cup of powdered nondairy creamer and/or 1 tablespoon of malted-milk powder. 

Triumph of Mind Over Matter

Opening lead — king of clubs.

Bridge is basically a game of probabilities, with most of the key decisions based on the chance that one set of circumstances is more likely to exist than another.

However, probabilities should not always be followed blindly. Other factors frequently enter into the overall calculations, and one of the most important is that the aim of the game is to win.

For example, consider the accompanying deal where declarer is trying to make five diamonds. Since he will go down only if he loses two spades and a diamond, all his thoughts should be directed toward trying to prevent this from happening.

After ruffing the club lead, South leads the queen of diamonds, to which West follows with the deuce. Ordinarily, declarer would play dummy's ace, because the percentages slightly favor a 1-1 division when two cards are missing.

But in the present case, South should finesse the queen. Why? Because if he does, he is certain to make the contract, while if he doesn't, he may and in the actual deal will – go down one when West later gains the lead with the king of trumps and leads a spade through dummy's king.

Conversely, if the diamond finesse loses to East's king, which is certainly a good possibility, the wound is not mortal, as there is nothing East can then do to stop the contract.

For example, let's say he returns a club. Declarer ruffs and cashes his four high hearts, discarding a spade from dummy. As a result, his only losers prove to be a diamond and a spade.

In this case, the trump finesse, though it may run against the probabilities, serves a far more important purpose: It assures the contract.
