Chancellor, RLM Training Center Easter is ... more than boiled eggs and chocolate. The message of fertility is seriously overrated.

This spring occasion was named after the Mother Goddess-Eastre, of the early Saxon people in northern Europe, which was celebrated for fertility. The god of this celebration has nothing to do with the God of the Bible nor the suffering Son sent for the redemption of humanity.

Over the years we have learned to tolerate many things to celebrate our children, giving them opportunities for dress up and special treats. To this day, I still associate boiled eggs with spring and jelly beans.

Children are most impressionable and conditioning them to believe and follow myths will alter them long past childhood. How do you make the leap from fertility teachings with rabbits and chicken eggs, to the crucifixion and resurrection of Christ following His passion week? The truth will carry them further in life, even if you need to paint one as fiction and the other as fact.

Eastre can continue as a celebration of a mythic fertility goddess; while Resurrection Day can depict the factual event responsible for the possible redemption of humanity. Let the children dress up for both. Even give them boiled eggs and chocolate bunnies in the park and back yard. 
