She was also able to come away with the newest Wii electronic game system.

The academy has three Wii systems, she said, but that doesn't mean the students sit around and play games. They can do physical education and even work up a sweat, she said. With the Wii, they can make up their own flash cards if they are studying for a test or create videos from photographs.

Morgan said the Wii system, by Nintendo, is a fabulous learning

"It is a virtual brain academy ... they can learn such things as medical terminology," she said. "They understand and can explain the law of gravitational force."

The students are not all doing the same things at the same time, and they are honest about what they do, she said.

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
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
