

Students fake injuries for tornado drill

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Students in the Cobly basic Emergency Medical Technician class feigned agony, their arms and legs dripping fake blood.

Some were strapped to gurneys while others winced in pain as they clutched an arm or leg coated with more fake blood.

The students were part of some elaborate "April Fools" prank, just playing the role of victims during a mock tornado drill put on by students' ideas.

the Thomas County Emergency Management Department.

Dawnelle Umberger, county cardiopulmonary resuscitation instructor, said the exercise was a way for the students to get some real-life training. She said the students came up with scenarios on how and where they would get hurt during a tornado. Some of those included a chisel going over a person's leg, another's legs being trapped under a farm implement and glass embedded in arms and legs.

Umberger said she was impressed with the

The fake blood the "victims" had caked on various parts of their bodies during the drill was a result of Umberger taking a "moulage" class where she learned how to make fake cuts look real. She said the class taught her how fake blood, vomit and burns.

The emergency medical course began in January and will end Saturday, when the students take their state test. Five out of the eight students who started the course plan to take the test and join the Thomas County ambulance
