# City agrees to help Arma with dispute

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A battle over a new energy contract between the tiny city of Arma and Westar Energy Corp., one of the largest electric providers in to Midwest Energy," said City Kansas, has captured the attention Manager Carolyn Armstrong. of the Colby City Council.

The council approved \$1,022 to help Arma shoulder the costs involved with a complaint it filed with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission against Westar at its meeting Tuesday evening.

Armstrong said Westar had told Arma officials its new deal would be a 20-year contract with an automatic increase of 3 percent a year and that was the only choice the city had.
