### Deputies to train on vehicle checks

Thomas County residents may soon be able to get the vehicle identification number on a used car they want to register from the county sheriff's department, instead of waiting for a state trooper out of

Sheriff Rod Taylor told the county commissioners on Monday that he plans to have training later this summer for the vehicle identification number program. Officers will learn how to perform number checks to identify vehicles for change of ownership

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# Three charged in college burglary

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Three Colby Community College students have been arrested for allegedly stealing a laptop computer, an iPod and a pair of shoes from the dorm room of two other student-athletes, said Colby Chief of Police Randy Jones.

Jones said freshman Maria Rodriguez, a runner on the women's cross country and track teams at the college, and freshman Roberto Romero, and sophomore Anthony Whiteman, both members of the cross country team, are accused of stealing from the room of Appollo and Jernato Harris, freshman brothers at the college and members of this year's Trojan's

The police department received a call on a burglary and theft at the college on April 8, the chief said. Cpl. Ron Alexander, Officer John Dixon and Detective Richard Barrett investigated the case. The Harrises told the police the items had been stolen from their room between 5:30 and 6:30 p.m. while they were having dinner, he said. Based on conversations with people, the officers contacted Rodriguez, who agreed to let them search her car.

Jones said they found an iPod, a laptop computer and pair of shoes in her trunk. A conversation with Rodriguez led the police to Romero and Whiteman. All three were taken into custody.

Rodriguez, a 19-year-old from

Nebraska, was charged with aiding and abetting theft and burglary and possession of stolen property. Romero, a 20-year-old from Nebraska, and Whiteman, a 20-yearold from Colorado, were both charged with theft and burglary.

The three were released from the Thomas County Jail on signature bonds. Rodriguez was released on the day of her arrest, Whiteman on April 10 and Romero on April 11. No court date has been established for the three as of yet, said Jones.

The chief said said there was no evidence the theft was linked to the thefts of television and video equipment stolen from the Health Sciences Building and Ferguson Hall buildings on campus in early February.

# Midwest states join forces for emergency training event

TOPEKA (AP) — Four Midwestern states are when the disease moves to the state. working together this month to improve their response to natural disasters, terrorism and foreign animal disease.

This week, the states are simulating an introduction of foreign animal disease in Iowa, with Kansas activating its emergency operations center

Kansas also will put on parts of the event at Crisis City, a training area at the Great Plains Joint Training Center in Salina.

The event concludes Wednesday, June 24. It is designed to identify gaps that may exist between response organizations.

Thomas County Emergency Management Director Susan McMahan said the training event will be for the state's emergency response agencies and that the county's agencies will not be involved.
