Township requests help with power lines

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A township board grabbed the attention of the Thomas County commissioners Monday when the members asked the commissioners to intervene in a road dispute.

Officials of Rovohl Township, about three miles north of Colby, sent the commissioners a letter asking their help to determine if the power poles on a section of County Road Z, about seven miles north of Colby, are actually planted in the middle of where the road should be.

There has been some concern in the past regarding two landowners deciding where the property line was, officials said.

"It looks like the township board is wanting a little help in wanting us to find a way to settle the matter,' said Chairman Ken Christiansen.

Todd Unruh of Midwest Energy, the rural electric cooperative serving the area, said in order to move the poles, they would need a request from the county.

"That's a three-phase line, and the poles are over

15 years old, and we'd have to put in all new poles to bring the line up to code," he said, adding that the cost would be about \$56,000 per mile.

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Much of the discussion centered around who the easement belonged to when the poles were set many vears ago.

'There is a possibility that it was a private or non-passable road at the time," Christiansen said. "However, state law says all roads are open unless declared closed. It probably started out as a sectionline trail, and then when irrigation came to the area, the township started maintaining it as farm-to-market access.'

"It could have been that neighbors had an agreement, and the placing of the poles benefited both, and that's where they decided the poles would be set," Unruh said.

In a telephone interview, Bob Amos, whose farm the line serves, said the poles had been there for the last 20 years or more. The Amos family has lived there since 1918, he said, and never had any fuss about where the poles were.
