"It doesn't make any difference to me if they move the poles over erly installed and water came in onto my property," Amos said, "because it's in the Conservation Reserve Program anyway. I think it is the farmer who purchased the land several years ago who just found out he might be missing an acre or so. It was that way when he bought it, and to me, it isn't worth it to spend that kind of money to move the poles. We're not even involved in this deal." Commissioner Paul Steele asked who would be harmed if the commissioners don't do anything.

"We don't want to see anyone have to spend that kind of money to move the poles if it isn't necessary," he said.

Unruh said one simple solution would be to terminate the line at the mile marker ahead of the problem area, but it might cause complications if the line feeds irrigation wells to the west.

"The cost would have to go to the people who requested the change, and would have to be assessed to them," Steele said, "and then we ask, how badly do we want them moved?"

The commissioners said the project is just in the "exploring options" stage, and they tabled the request until Midwest can gather information and get back to them at Monday's meeting.

Al Smith, custodian at the county office complex, reported that rain last week seeped through a broken area of concrete on the east side of the building and got
