Peace garden project fulfills award

Whoever said that kids today don't have ambition, has never met Amanda Barnum, a 16-year-old Colby Girl Scout. Amanda's drive and hard work have led her to receive the the highest honor a Girl Scout, ages 14-18, can achieve, the Girl Scout Gold Award.

Only five percent of Girl Scouts ever receive their Gold Award. According to Terrilyn Fleming, Barnum's Gold Award advisor and troop co-leader, no other Girl Scout in the area has received this award in at least the last five

"The Gold Award signifies forethought and a level of selflessness not often seen in teenagers today. I am extremely proud of Amanda," Fleming said.

Barnum chose as her Gold Award project to create a peace garden, a place of quiet reflection, on the United Methodist Church campus in Colby. she put in more than a hundred hours into her project including fund raising, planning, gathering materials, and building the peace garden. She had to consider a project which would fulfill a need in her community and be an ongoing creation, not just an event.

"It was something I thought the church could really benefit from," Barnum said.

She said that the garden overlooks the valley with the three crosses, a place the church often has Easter services when the weather allows. Amanda felt the


