College approves budget

The Colby Community College board approved a \$10,544,874 budget for 2009-2010 year at a public meeting on Monday at Thomas Hall on campus.

The school's fiscal year began on July 1 and will end on June 30. The budget includes spending \$205,000 on adult education, \$6,000 on adult supplemental education and \$1,740,000 on auxiliary enterprises.


business affairs and chief financial officer at the college, said the money for auxiliary enterprise covers operation of the book store, food services and dormitories. Adult education expenses include instructional supplies, faculty salaries and equipment, he said.

The property tax will raise \$2,695,908 with a levy of 33.28 mills. The 2009 mill levy was 34.52, said Thomas County Clerk Shelly Harms.

Waites said this represents the money the college will get from

Alan Waites, vice president of county taxpayers to help pay for operations. He said the college has has not received any money from the state.

For every \$1,000 of a home's assessed value, property owners will pay about \$33.28 in taxes to the college, said Waites. For example a person with a home assessed at \$10,000 would pay about \$332.80 in taxes to the college. That same home would be worth about \$86,900 on the open market, said George Overton, Thomas County deputy appraiser.

District talks cuts with public

ride.

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Parents asked whether their children would be safe crossing busy streets as the Colby School District drops most in-town bus service during two community meetings Monday and Tuesday held to explain district budget cuts.

About 15 people, including parents, faculty and staff, attended the first night, with about 10 the second night. Bussing was a big concern, and several people asked about safety with more kids crossing in traffic.

Superintendent Terrell Harrison said the district will have staff members posted as crossing guards at problem intersections around the schools, including Fourth Street and Range Avenue.

Two new loading zones have been established, one at a parking lot by the grade school and the other on Garfield Avenue east of the school complex. These will be reserved for pick-up and drop-off before and after school times.

Harrison said school release times have been staggered to reduce congestion, and parents with students of different ages will be told to wait for each student at the youngest one's pick-up area. Harrison said the district will have more information for parents at enrollment on Thursday and Friday.

Some areas in the city limits are more than $2 \frac{1}{2}$ miles from one building or another, Harrison said, and those students will still be eligible for a bus

Harrison began both meetings with a short presentation on the state's economic situation and budget

cuts, followed by a question-and-answer session. State revenue projections are low and actual revenues have been lower still, she said, forcing the Legislature and Gov. Mark Parkinson to slash the budget and delay payment to schools for some programs, including special education.

"Kansas is facing the worst budget crisis in decades," she said.

Harrison said the state has cut \$550 million in general-fund expenditures, \$125.5 million of that from public schools. Base state aid was cut by \$215 per student, she said, special education has been cut and professional development, or teacher training, money was eliminated.

"Our district has lost over half a million dollars," Harrison said.

The district budgeted for an estimated 929 students for coming year, she said, noting that they usually plan on a drop of 2 to 4 percent per year. Business Manager Jo DeYoung said that when she started with the district in 1994, it had 1,340 students.

To compound the problem, Harrison said, a group of school districts sued the state, claiming they were not getting enough money to do their jobs. They won the suit, and all districts got more money in 2005 and each year after that.
