

# Is food safe in dented cans?

Dear Heloise: Can you address the safety of USING FOOD FROM DENTED CANS? I was taught to NEVER use them, but my friend does all the time and says as long as it isn't bulged, it's OK. Who is right? – Susan S., via e-mail

Remember the old adage "When in doubt, throw it out"? That is the mantra you should follow. According to the USDA Food Safety Department, you should not eat food from cans that are leaking, bulging, rusting or BADLY DENTED. Even a tiny puncture can allow bacteria to contaminate the contents. Your family's health isn't worth the risk. – Heloise

P.S.: Don't buy dented cans! But, if you drop it on the floor at home and dent it, it's OK to open and eat right then.


Any time is a good time for a delicious cup of tea. Here in South Texas, iced tea is the favorite! I do brew fresh tea to make iced tea. Yes, it might Difficulty Level ★★★ be a little more effort, but it tastes sooo much better. Here is how I learned to brew tea from a dear friend, Mrs. Carey. Put the water on to boil and bring the teapot to the kettle, not the kettle to the pot. Put in 1 teaspoonful of loose tea leaves or a regular-size tea bag (Mrs. C. would frown at tea bags!) per cup. Pour in the boiling water, stir two or three times if using tea leaves, then let brew for 3-5 minutes. It's better to make it stronger and dilute with water than add too much hot water to brew. ## A Picture Is Worth 1,000 Words

The language of bidding in bridge contains only 15 words: spades, hearts, diamonds, clubs, notrump, double, redouble, pass and the numbers one through seven. Nevertheless, despite this limited vocabulary, a competent pair will reach their best contract on the great majority of deals.

But even the very best players occasionally get confused about the meaning of their bids. Witness this deal from a team match where the play-

At the first table, South doubled East's opening spade bid, and West redoubled, showing 10 or more points. North passed, and East did likewise. South then bid two clubs, which West doubled.

At this point, South elected to redouble. He intended this as an SOS asking North to choose between diamonds and hearts. But North apparently misunderstood the plea for help and passed.

played a diamond to the jack, ruffed a spade, led a diamond to the queen and ruffed dummy's last spade with the king. West overruffed and returned the seven of clubs, dummy's ten losing to the queen. Declarer later scored two more tricks, but went down two redoubled -- 600 points.

The East-West pair had every reason to believe they had achieved an excellent result, until they learned what happened to their North-South
