The first Internet-assisted hunter education course testing session and field day will be held from noon to 6 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 29, at the Colby Trap Club.

The event is being sponsored by the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks. Students are expected complete the quizzes featured at the end of each chapter, said Benny Young, Department of Wildlife and Parks natural resources offi-

Logan and Sheridan counties. He ing range. Young said ethics and said the students would take a pretest at the beginning of the session to prove they had read the chapters. They also will need to turn in a printout of the answers to the chapter quizzes.

To receive four hours credit (of the 10 hour minimum required by law) students must correctly answer 22 out of 25 questions in the pre-test. Those who fail to get the to read 14 chapters online and minimum score will be dismissed from the class.

After the pre-test, the students will participate in a field session where they will shoot at clay picer and game warden for Thomas, geons with shotguns at the shoot-

gun handling would be discussed during the training session. After the field session the real test will be taken.

The Internet format is being adopted by departments in every state for hunter education courses, because it saves money that would have been spent buying books and mailing hunter education manuals, said Young.


