Ivan L. Parker, 72, Colby, died Monday, Aug. 17, 2009, at his home in Colby.

He was born Nov. 5, 1936, in Humbolt, Neb., to Nello and Imo (Gates) Parker. He married Pat Wheaton on March 7, 1959.

Parker loved truck driving, and worked in the oil field for Murfin Drilling for 31 years. He started as a water hauler in Stratton, Neb., in 1977. In 1980, he moved to Colby, where he was an assistant truck supervisor until his retirement in February.
