"They are a group of broadcast boosters who make all the sports broadcasts possible," Epp said.

J & R, run by Epp and his wife Judy, handles radio and television advertising for several businesses and promotes concerts in northwest Kansas, he said.

In the summer of 2007, after falling out with KRDQ, Epp signed a contract with the college allowing him to use time on KTCC for \$2,500 a semester to cover college and high school athletics, said President Lynn Kreider. Epp has broadcast sports for over four decades and has been named Sports Broadcaster of the Year by the Kansas Association of Broadcasters on two occasions. He graduated from the college radio program in 1972, in the first class of radio students in the school's history.
