


This is a logic-based number placement puzzle.

Famous Hand

There are times when a player can make a frivolous bid and get away with it because whatever 20 happens afterward does not cost very much. But if the hand comes up in the semifinal of the U.S. Bridge Championship, and your indiscretion allows the opponents to make a slam that otherwise might have failed, it can prove very costly indeed.

That's exactly what happened on this deal in the U.S. trials to select a team for the 2008 World Mind Sports Games in Beijing last fall. The bidding shown took place when Larry Cohen and 3 David Berkowitz held the North-South cards. After Berkowitz's two-notrump opening, North's 3 three-spade bid followed by four clubs indicated interest in a diamond slam. When Berkowitz later 3: cuebid five clubs, West doubled to indicate good clubs, and South eventually became declarer in six diamonds.

West led a heart, and Berkowitz guessed correctly to play the ten, capturing East's king with the ace. Next came the diamond ace and ten --West showing out - followed by a spade to the queen. The K-Q-J of diamonds left no one with any trumps, and the A-K of spades were then cashed.

South had won all the tricks to this point, and four remained to be played. Thanks to the opening lead and the double by West, it was not difficult to figure out what to do next. So Berkowitz cashed the queen of hearts and exited with a heart, forcing West to win and lead from the K-J of clubs into South's A-Q at the end.

Berkowitz might, of course, have found the winning play without West's helpful double, but it sure didn't hurt to have that information to work with when the critical decision had to be made.
