Colby college squad falls to Cloud by five

The Colby Community College men's basketball team's Achilles heel this season has been its first half performances. Time and time again the Trojans have fell behind by double digits in the first half, only to claw their way back into the game in the second. Sometimes their comebacks resulted in victories and others have ended in narrow defeats.

Colby's game on Saturday did not follow the same familiar script, however. The men's team started the game like a house of fire and built what was at one point an 11-point lead in the first half, but Cloud County Community College from Concordia rallied and took home a 68-63 victory.

Poor field goal shooting and a glaring disparity in fouls committed between the two teams proved to be Colby's downfall. The Trojans only shot 30 percent from the field and they were called for 36 fouls, while their opponents only had 18. This lopsided statistic can be partly attributed to Colby having to foul towards the end of the were some Trojan's fans who voiced their displeasure with foul calls made in the game.

were kicked out of the game by the referees late in the game for allegedly vocally disagreeing with calls made by the officials. Despite the substantial difference in fouls committed by the two teams, coach Dustin Pfeifer wasn't about to blame the loss on the referees.

"I'm not going to use the refs as an excuse," said Pfeifer. "We had

the game," he said.

Sophomore Aireus Stephenson fired a beautiful pass to Corey Woofter from the top of the key that Woofter laid in to give the Colby an early 2-0 lead. Moments later, freshman Regis Schafer drilled a three to make it 5-2 Trojans. A reverse layup by Stephenson followed by a jumper from the right baseline by Woofter gave Colby a 15-7 advantage. Sophomore Dominic Brewer tipped in a missed layup by Stephenson to increase the Trojans' lead to 18-7. It would turn out to be Colby's biggest lead of the night.

The Trojans momentum was thwarted by foul problems as freshman Jose Peña-Benjamin and sophomore Jordan Michelson were taken out of the game after they both picked up their second foul. Cloud County took full advantage of their absence, going on a 10-0 run to cut the Trojans' lead

Michelson returned to the game and scored on a layup inside to extend his team's lead to 20-17. Stephenson drained a short jumper near the free-throw-line to make it 22-17. The Thunderbirds scored game to stop the clock, but there the games next five points and tied the game at 22. Cloud eventually overtook Colby and led 23-22. But the Thunderbirds' lead Larry McDonald and Ron Boller would be short-lived. In the half's final moments the Trojans caused Cloud to commit a turnover in the backcourt that led to a layup by Stephenson giving Colby a 24-23 halftime lead.

Peña-Benjamin drilled a jumper to cut the lead to three. The teams continued to go at each other with the Thunderbirds clinging to a narrow lead. Peña-Benjamin buried a big three-pointer from the left wing to cut Cloud's lead to 48-50 with a little under four minutes left. The Thunderbirds responded by rattling off seven points and taking a 57-48 lead.

> In what has become the team's trademark, the Trojans clawed their way back into the game. Freshman Michael Morris gave Colby a big lift in the games final minutes by scoring a few buckets off of rebounds, including a onehand jam. He made a layup inside the paint to cut Cloud's lead to 63-66 with 5.8 remaining. The Trojans fouled the Thunderbirds' Dewayne Wade to stop the clock. Wade sank both his free throws ending Colby's chance at making a comeback.

> Stephenson and Morris led the team in scoring with 12 points each. Morris had a team-high 9 rebounds. Peña-Benjamin and Michelson both had 10 each.

> Pfeifer managed to take some positives away from the game.
