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Be careful what you wish for, especially when dreaming of a "White Christmas."

Northwest Kansas, including

Thomas County, is under a winter storm warning. An incoming storm is expected to dump eight inches of snow by Friday, maybe more.

The National Weather Service expects a high near 35 degrees today,

with rain starting sometime snow overnight. A layer of ice - less than a quarter inch - may form under the snow, which may accumulate up to two inches. The snow could pile up over the week. Chances of new snow will be less by calling 511 from most land-line

peeking out again on Saturday.

Winds up to 30 miles per hour with possible gusts up to 40 – Wednesday and Thursday will cause "near blizzard conditions,"

blowing snow and low visibility. The "winter strom warning" means snow is nearly certain, the

service said, but amounts and conditions will be short of a fullblow blizzard.

Thomas County Emergency Management Director Susan McMahan suggests that anyone with plans to travel make sure they reach their destina-

tion by tonight. Visibility before midnight and turning to could be cut to a mile in some places during the storm, and travel is not recommended Wednesday through Friday, she said.
