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County ends budget year up \$300,000

The Thomas County commissioners had big smiles on their faces Thursday when they learned the county had underspent the 2009 budget by slightly over \$300,000.

County Clerk Shelly Harms had prepared an end-of-year report for to show commissioners where the savings had come from. Showing up big on the report were the interest received from delinquent taxes, savings in the sheriff's budget, motor-vehicle tax, fees taken in by various county offices and the county sales tax.

"This is great," said Commissioner Paul Steele, "We're in the black and had absolutely no room in the 2010 budget for a new boiler for the courthouse because we

The commissioners also reserved \$20,000 for the sheriff's department, \$25,000 to pay the December bills and will roll over the rest, about \$155,000, into the general fund for the 2010 budget.

The commissioners praised the departments, noting that they were able to reduce the levy for the landfill and didn't levy anything for the ambulance department because it was holding its own, and it looked like there would be money in the fund when the time comes to buy a new ambulance.

The sheriff underspent his budget by more than \$162,000 in spite of some outcry from the public earlier this year about overtime.

The wellness committee says improved blood scores can show improved health, along with reduced weight. Before and after testing can show a "count down" of cholesterol and/ or blood sugar. Tests include a complete blood count, lipid profile, glucose (blood sugar) and other chemistry.

Heavy snowfall expensive for state

TOPEKA (AP) - The WhiteChristmas much of Kansas awoke to came with a big cost, made bigger by overtime and holiday pay for road workers.

The state Department of Transportation is still tallying the exwinter storm hit Kansas during the long holiday weekend.

Department spokesman Steve Swartz said a snowstorm of the duration the state experienced typically would cost about \$2.2 million. "

But since this storm took place over a holiday, pay rates and labor cost will be greater," he said.

Swartz said it will take a few weeks before officials know precisely how much the storm cost because most of the expenses relate to payroll, and some won't be processed until mid-January.
