The Colby Community College Lady Trojans will be in action for the first time in almost a month when they compete in the Jayhawk Shoot-Out this weekend in per. Coffeyville.

The women will play Johnson County Community College at 1 p.m. Friday and Labette County Community College at 9 a.m. Sunday. Both teams have impressive records, Johnson County, a division 2 team from Overland Park, is ranked No. 5 on the national junior college website and has a 12-0. Labette, from Parsons, is 10-2.

Colby (2-12) has had to deal with injuries this season that left the team playing shorthanded. The blow that had the most profound affect was when freshman forward Hannah Thornton suffered a concussion during a Colby Ambassador Classic game against Colorado Northwestern Community College on Nov. 12. She was 8 for 8 from the field in the game. She tried to play the next day against Independence Community College in another tourna-
