


Dear Dr. Brothers: There is a sweet couple in the apartment next to mine. We are friends, and my 12-year-old likes to visit their new baby. But she tells me they never let the baby be by herself - she is always in the same room as one of the parents. They work at home, and I don't see how they get anything done! Shouldn't the baby sleep in her own room and learn how to comfort herself? She is 2 months old now. - C.V.

Dear C.V.: One of the most exciting things in the world to a new parent is to be near the baby. If the mother is nursing, there is a strong emotional pull to be with her child, and the baby's cries and murmurs stimulate the let-down reflex so that Mom can provide nourishment for her child. Many parents today – fathers included – practice attachment parenting, which includes "wearing" the baby, much like parents in other cultures do. What seems strange to us wouldn't to others, who don't separate parent and child at night or when going about chores during the day. While it may bother you to think of the child in the same room with a working parent, to them it may be the way they feel most comfortable.

But you do have a good point about the child learning to comfort herself. While the first need is for security, a baby also benefits from learning to fall asleep without being held. These will come in time, as the new mother and father feel more comfortable leaving the infant in her own space. As long as they are acting out of love and not fear that something will happen to the baby if she isn't in sight, I don't have a problem with their style. It will be impossible to keep up forever, and they will learn to separate. So let your child see this loving family for just what it is.



Pinpoint Defense

In bridge, the opportunity for brilliance seldom arises; rather, excellence is dependent upon a 18 player's consistently making the right bid or play whenever it is his turn, even in the most mundane circumstances.

Nevertheless, when the occasion for something special does arise, he should be prepared to make a play that might be well off the beaten path.

Consider this deal where West led the king of clubs, East playing the five and South the six. West then shifted to the deuce of spades. East took dummy's ten with the jack and continued with the ace of spades, on which West had to 33 make a discard.

The winning play was not long in coming: On the ace of spades, West discarded the ace of clubs! This was undoubtedly a spectacular discard -- but that was not the purpose of the play.

The purpose was to tell East as clearly and as emphatically as possible not to lead a club at trick four, which is what East almost surely would have done without the benefit of West's ace-ofclubs play. So East led a third round of spades, and declarer could not stop West from scoring the setting trick with the king of trumps.

What does the hand teach us? Essentially, it demonstrates that top-notch defense depends not only on occasional individual brilliance, but also on partnership cooperation. West realized, at trick three, that the only sure way to beat the contract was to get East to lead a spade at trick four. West therefore chose the extraordinary discard of the ace of clubs to try to get that message across, and East's spade return showed that he had gotten the message loud and clear.
