Eagles give up lead late, lose home game by nine

The Eagles' basketball team just ran out of gas Tuesday at the

Community Building. Colby was playing a solid game, leading 37-29 early in the third quarter, but then Garden City took control and never let up.

The Buffaloes erased the eightpoint deficit and went on to win

Senior Ryley Haas was the catalyst for the Eagles' strong start. He hit a three-pointer that hit the front of rim and rolled to the backboard before dropping in to give his team a 3-0 lead right off. A little later in the first quarter, Haas made his presence felt on both ends of the court. After creating a turnover on defense, he drilled another three to give his team a 6-3 lead.

The Buffaloes fought back and eventually went up 9-8. Colby senior Chaz Winger scored a bucket while drawing contact from a defender to recapture the lead. He drained his free throw to give the Eagles an 11-8 lead. Moments later, Haas drilled another jumper to extend the boys' lead to 13-9.

Cody Bernbeck of Garden City found Billy Phipps with a nice bounce pass down low that Phipps laid in to narrow the gap to 13-11. Winger knocked down a jumper from the left baseline to give Col-

to cut Colby's lead to 17-14. The Buffaloes scored the next two points to bring the game within one. Then Haas drove down the lane and drew a foul while trying to make a layup. He sank both his free throws to give his team a 19-

Later in the quarter, junior Corbin Stephens rebounded a missed shot by junior Kale Arnberger and stuck it back in to stretch Colby's lead to 23-16. The boys continued to control the tempo of the game during the quarter. Near the end of the half, Stephens found junior Andrew Ketchum for a baseline jumper to make it 28-20 Colby. The Eagles led 30-23 at halftime.

Things started swimmingly for the Eagles in the third quarter. Haas scored five quick points, including his third three-pointer, to extend the Eagles' lead to 37-29 early in the third. Then the pendulum swung in the other direction as the Buffaloes took control. The visitors scored 15 of the games next 20 points to take a 44-41 City and Friday at Quinter.

The Colby boys still had a little

by a 15-11 lead at the end of the left in the tank in the fourth. The Eagles took a 48-47 lead when a determined Stephens scored inside on his third attempt.

Garden City recaptured the lead by getting a fast-break bucket off a turnover. They stretched it to 57-50 with less than two minutes Bernbeck nailed a three-pointer remaining. Haas knocked down a pair of free throws to cut the margin to 52-57, but Colby wouldn't get any closer as Garden City picked up a 63-54 victory.

Haas had a team-high 19 points, including hitting three of six three-pointers. Stephens added 11, Winger 10 and Braden Mc-Kee eight. Senior Brock Wagoner, Ketchum and Arnberger all had

The Eagles were dogged by turnovers in the game, especially in the second half. Colby ended with 25 turnovers. This led to the Buffaloes taking 13 more shots than the Eagles in the second half. Colby also had trouble dealing with Garden City's deep bench which outscored the Eagles' bench 38-4. The Buffaloes also won the battle in the paint outscoring Col-

"They were a little deeper than us," said McKee.

Kansas, No. 1 for the second straight week after three weeks out of the top spot, outrebounded a physical Texas lineup 45-34, held the Longhorns to 37 percent shooting and scored 27 points off 17 turnovers.

And when Texas finally staged a late rally, Kansas slammed the door behind senior point guard Sherron Collins, who had 15 points.
