Supreme Court denies bid to reopen 2006 school money suit

TOPEKA — The Kansas Supreme Court denied a petition Friday from school districts seeking to reopen a 2006 school finance case, saying there is nothing that districts can't accomplish by filing a new

have the power to reopen a case, it should be used with extreme caution and that there were other issues that must be resolved, including whether the original plaintiffs have standing to sue.


