The famous Goodland and Colby sports rivalry lived up to its billing on Tuesday at the Community Building.

The Eagles' basketball team beat rival Goodland 52-51 in a game that went down to the final buzzer. Colby had to mount a fourth quarter rally to get the victory.

"We realized we might lose to a rival," said senior Ryley Haas.

The Eagles were really in a rhythm offensively in the second half, hitting almost 55 percent of their shots.

"We got a lot of good inside looks," said Haas. "Your confidence goes up once you hit a couple of inside shots. When your confidence is way up," you can make anything."

Coach Jon McKee said he was happy with how the boys ran their offense.

"We were getting the ball inside and kicking the ball out," he said.

Junior Corbin Stephens scored the winning bucket when he knifed through the lane past a couple Cowboy defenders and made a layup to give the Eagles a 52-51 lead with 29.5 seconds

Several seconds later Stephens was fouled Senior Brock Wagoner knocked down a on a drive down the lane. The referee ruled he was fouled before he tried to score so he was faced with a one-and-one free-throw situation.

Unfortunately for the Eagles, Stephens fouled the Cowboy's Hillman on an inbounds pass in backcourt. Hillman hit both his free throws to make it 51-50 Goodland. But Stephens quickly recovered from his mental error by slicing through the Cowboys' defense and making a layup to put Colby up 52-51 with 29.5 seconds left.

Winger was whistled for a foul down low on the Eagles' next defensive stand. Goodland's player missed both his free throws and junior Spencer Tubbs got the rebound and passed to Winger who was fouled while taking the ball up the court. He missed the front end of a oneand-one free throw giving the Cowboys one more chance to win the game. They got won good look at the basket, but it clanked off the front of the rim and Colby came away with a

Coach McKee called the win a complete team effort. He also said he was happy with the way his team handled Goodland's press during the game.

"We were breaking the press with a pass instead of a dribble," he said.

Colby only committed 13 turnovers.

Stephens had 29 and Haas scored 10, including two three pointers. Braden McKee scored six and grabbed nine rebounds, Wagoner, five. Ketchum, two points, four assists, Tubbs, two points, three blocks and Winger, two points.

With the win, Colby improved to 6-12. They will play Rawlins County at 8 p.m. Friday at the Community Building.
