One of a series of workshops on Risk-Assessed Marketing crop insurance over the next couple of months will be held Thursday, March 4, in Goodland.

including the SURE and ACRE programs, and expanded biofuel and ethanol production, combined with volatile crop prices, have producers considering different methods for managing yield and price risk," said Art Barnaby, agricultural economist with Kansas State University Research and Extension. "This workshop will introduce producers to an integrated marketing/production management approach that combines government programs, crop insurance and alternative marketing techniques."

Named after the Risk-Assessed Marketing crop insurance and grain marketing programs available to farmers, the workshops are called RAM II because they now include the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE) and Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) programs.

The workshops are sponsored by K-State Research and Extension, the North Central Risk Management Education Center at the University of Nebraska, and Ohio State University Extension. For information about the Good-

Agriculture survey looks at farm finances

Agriculture Statistics Service is conducting its Agricultural Resource Management Survey, which helps shape policies, programs and issues that affect them.

Glenda Shepler, state director of the statistical department, said the survey asks a small sampling of farmers about their operations in order to understand the current financial state of U.S. agriculture.

Participation is important because government and agricultural leaders use the information to make

Beginning in January, the U.S. Department of decisions that affect the future of farmers, their families and businesses.

> The survey, to be conducted between Jan. 31 and Mar. 30, is being sent to 35,000 farmers and stockmen nationwide, including 1,616 in Kansas. They will be asked to provide information on their operating expenditures, production costs and households.

> All information is confidential by law, but economic data gathered will be published in the annual Farm Production Expenditures report on Aug. 5. Reports are available online at www.nass.usda.gov.
