The Colby College Lady Trojans fell to highly ranked Butler County Community College 84-37 in a road game on Wednesday.

Coach Brady Jasper said the Grizzlies jumped out to an early lead. The Colby women cut Butler County's lead to 14 points early in the second half. The Grizzlies extended their lead to over 40 points by hitting several three-pointers near the end of the game..

Sophomore Tasha Wagoner posted a double-double for Colby, scoring 15 points and grabbing 11 rebounds. Freshman Hannah Thornton scored six points and pulled down five rebounds.

Sophomore Danisha Cole, who had been the team's leading scorer lately, did not play or suit up for the game again. During the halftime of the Lady

Trojans' game against Garden City on Sunday, Cole said she would not be returning to the team.

With the loss, the team dropped to 3-22 and 1-13 in the Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference.

The women will be holding a special Pink Zone night when they play Hutchinson at 6 p.m. Saturday at the Community Building to raise awareness and money for breast cancer. The money will go to the Kay Wow/ Women's Basketball Coaches Association Cancer Fund.

Wow, a former women's basketball coach at North Carolina State, died of breast cancer in Jan. 2009. She was a past president and founding member of the association. The organization raises money for cancer research and treatment.

# Young Lady Eagles fall to rival

The Colby Middle School eighth-grade girls A team mounted a comeback late in the fourth quarter, but time was not on their side, and they lost by 2 points to rival Goodland 32-24 Thursday at the grade school gym.

The Lady Mustangs jumped got off to a strong start and led 8-2 at the end of the first quarter. The Lady Eagles' Haleigh Shull buried a short jump shot to cut Goodland's lead to 9-4 early in the second.

Later in the half, Colby's Madison Rogers knocked down a jumper from the left baseline to narrow the gap to 10-8. The Lady Mustangs' Hope Cochran grabbed a rebound and stuck it back in to give her team a 12-8 lead, and Goodland led 14-8 at the half.

The Lady Mustangs had a strong third quarter and led Colby 24-12 going into the fourth. Goodland's Mora Kling knocked down a jumper to extend the lead to 26-12. Shull got a steal and sped down court, she did a jump stop then banking in a layup to cut Goodland's lead to 28-14.

Rogers hit a short jumper that rattled around the rim before falling in to narrow the gap to 30-18. Then Shull made a reverse layup off a turnover to cut the Lady Mustangs' lead to 30-22. Goodland made a few free throws off a foul plus a technical called on Colby in the final minutes and went home with a 32-24 win.

Shull had a team-high eight points and Rogers and Andrea Rall had four each.

Andrea Barton, Kianna Griffin and Morgan and Haley Mengel all had two.

Abbie Friesen had a seven rebounds combined in the A and B games. Shull had five rebounds, Barton grabbed two and Griffin and Rall each had one.

The girls were 12 for 34 from the field. They went four for 16 in the first half and eight of 18 in the second.
