

Top seeds labeled for special notice

The All-America Selections symbol seen in many seed catalogs this time of year is something we should all give our undivided attention to.

The symbol -a red, white and blue shield - is not difficult to see, and it's beside some of the very best vegetable and flower selections. All-America Selections is a 75-year-old nonprofit organization that evaluates new seed-grown flowers and vegetables from around the world. Only those proving to be significantly improved over comparable varieties receive All-America Selection honors

The process begins when plant breeders, who work several years to develop a new vegetable or flower, believe they have found one that's exceptional. They will then submit their new product to the All-America Selections committee. Maybe it's a unique green bean or carrot or any other vegetable that a grower has been able to breed with unusual sweetness or disease resistance. Maybe it's a new multi-colored columbine, a sunflower or a hardy marigold with a brighter color or later blooming reliability.

In all regions of North America, some 35 volunteer plant growers are asked to nurture these new plants over a three- or four-year period. These are carefully tested for all the traits necessary to produce a better-quality vegetable or flower. If, for any reason, these individual tests do not produce a su- when you do!



perior product at all of the test locations, they are eliminated. They might appear in the seed catalog or on the rack at the store, but they cannot display that red, white and blue shield. It becomes rather obvious, I think, that any All-America selection would be worthy of your garden or mine. We should look carefully for that symbol as we buy our seed this year.

Some of the more noteworthy All-America vegetable winners over the years has been Melody Spinach (1977), Derby green beans (1990), Sweet Success cucumbers (1983), Super Star onions (2001) and Salad Bowl lettuce (1952). A few of the flower offerings of Profusion zinnias (2000 through 2010) and the gorgeous new Mesa Yellow gaillardia (2010).

Some garden experts criticize the All-America Selections organization for not appointing and utilizing more test locations, and I'm sure that would be nice. However, there are indeed test locations in every single hardiness zone of North America, and that's good enough for me.


I'll continue to buy All-America Selection seed and plants and I highly recommend you do the same. You simple cannot go wrong


