Coach Jon McKee said Friday's game was Slavens' last home basketball game as an Eagle. His family is moving to Utah in next couple months and junior Corbin Stephens gave up his starting spot to let Justin start on Friday.

"That was big on Corbin's part to give him that opportunity," Coach McKee said.

The Eagles jumped out to a 4-0 lead early in the first quarter. Se-Stephens miss and laid it in to extend Colby's lead to 6-0.

Atwood scored the game's next three points to cut the boy's lead to three, but a reverse layup by Stephens upped the Eagles' lead to 8-3. Less than a minute later, Stephens scored on a tough drive to the hoop to give his team a seven-point lead. Wagoner drained a jumper inside the lane to extend Colby's lead to 12-3, and the boys led 12-6 at the end of the first quarter.

The Buffaloes' Marcus Portschy drained a three-pointer to cut the Eagles' lead to 12-9 in the second period. Later on, junior Kale Arnberger stole the ball in the Buffaloes' backcourt and took it in for a layup to give Colby a 16-9 lead.

Junior Andrew Ketchum gave the Eagles a boost on defense by taking a charge. Junior Spencer from the right baseline to give Colby a 24-11 lead with 2:52 left in the quarter. The boys led 26-17

Senior Chaz Winger knocked down a jumper to start the second half. The Eagles' defense really clamped down on the Buffaloes, holding them to only four points The Eagles would have won in the third quarter. Arnberger got easily with or without the basket, a layup off a turnover, Stephens made another reverse layup and Braden McKee scored inside to help give Colby a 41-21 lead at the end of the third.

> Tubbs got a big block early in the fourth and Winger banked a shot off the glass from close range to give the Eagles a 45-27 lead. A fast-break layup by Braden Mc-Kee upped Colby's lead to 57-34. Slavens made his layup with less than a minute remaining and Colby picked up a 59-38 win.

"Our defense played really good," said Jon McKee.

The coach said his team put nior Braden McKee rebounded a good pressure on the ball in the first half when they were playing man-to-man defense. He said they applied an "amoeba" zone defense in the second half.

Dominique Sutton added another 3-pointer to finish an eightpoint run that extended K-State's advantage to 71-55 with 8:05 remaining. At that point, the Wildcats (22-4, 9-3 Big 12) had hit 10 of their first 17 shots from 3-point range against an Oklahoma team with the worst 3-point defense in the Big 12. They finished 10-for-

"It felt good. When you make a couple 3s, you want to keep shooting," said Clemente, who has hit at least five 3-pointers in three of his last five games. "What can you do? You just keep shooting.'
