Stephens, stayed home with an illness leaving the Eagles without one of their leading scorers and playmakers.



Lane drilled a long three-pointer to put the Bluejays on top 11-8. Another three-pointer by Lane upped Norton's lead to 14-9. The Bluejays led 17-9 at the half.

Colby had trouble taking care of the ball in the first half. They committed 16 turnovers. Norton scored 12 points off the Eagles' turnovers. This led to the Bluejays getting off a lot more shots than Colby. Norton went six of 32 in the first half, while Colby hit three of 15 shots.

Senior Chaz Winger made a finger roll in the lane to cut Norton's lead to 19-11 in the third. Moments later, a turnaround jumper by the Bluejays' JD Gall gave Norton a double-digit lead. Junior Kale Arnberger nailed a threepointer with a defender in his face to narrow the gap to 21-14. The Bluejays got a bucket before Braden McKee made a five footer to make it 23-16.
