City to install new generator on well

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In an evenly divided vote, the Colby City Council dedided Tuesday to make some improvements to the city's two biggest wells, installing a backup generator on Well No. 12 and reworking the backup diesel motor on Well No. 13.

Well No. 12 is at the city shop on Copeland Avenue and Well No. 13 is by the water tower on College Drive.

The vote was 3-3 with Council members Pat Mallory, Fred Taylor and Beverly Eicher in favor and Omar Weber, Tim Hutfles and Dave Voss against. Mark Beringer was absent, so Mayor Ken Bieber broke the tie in favor of the motion.

The new generator will be run by a backup system that could be started remotely if the city loses electric power. Both wells currently have diesel motors as a backup, but someone has to go out and start them. The improvements to Well 13 include extending the

Man escapes truck fire

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A 76-year-old Selden man had to smash a window to escape Saturday after his truck and a trailer load of hay overturned and caught fire on a Thomas County road east of Colby.

Deputy Tom Graham of the Thomas County Sheriff's Office said Donald Spresser was driving south on County Road 32 about 11 a.m. Saturday pulling a flatbed trailer with his 2002 Dodge pickup when he began to drive up a muddy hill north of U.S. 83. The trailer, which was full of hay bales, slid sideways, its momentum pulling the truck over.

Graham said leaking gas and damaged electrical systems on the truck caused a fire, which engulfed

the vehicle and spread to the hay bales and some brush in the ditch on the side of the road.

Graham said Spresser used a large bolt to break the passenger-side window to get out. He had a bump on the head and some bleeding, but was otherwise uninjured. He was taken to Citizens Medical Center.

"It was miraculous," Graham said, who said the man was wearing a seat belt. "He was lucky to have as few injuries as he did."

The truck was a total loss, as the fire damaged almost the entire vehicle, Graham said, adding that Spresser could have been seriously injured or killed had he not broken the window and escaped.

The Rexford Fire Department responded to the fire. Graham said they spread the hay bales out and let them burn out. The Rexford ambulance and an ambulance from Colby went to the scene.
