# Lady Eagles fall to undefeated Cheney

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KINGMAN — The Chenev High Lady Cardinals exploited their size advantage, knocking the Colby Lady Eagles out of the Class 4A substate finals 56-35 on Saturday in Kingman.

Cheney post players Merissa Quick and Courtney Traxson combined to score 36 of the Lady Cardinals 56 points on 13-of-20 shooting. Together they grabbed 22 rebounds.

The Lady Eagles were ice cold from the field in the first half, hitting only one of 21 field goals.

Coach Parker McKee said he thought nerves played a role in his team's poor shooting.

"We played really nervous and timid at the start of the game," he said.

The coach said Cheney's post players also played a key role in Colby's low percentage. He said Lady Cardinals' size inside the lane forced the girls to alter a lot of their shots.

Colby trailed 26-6 at the half. Coach McKee said if the girls could have made a few more free throws, they would have had a better chance of making the game close in the second half. The Lady Eagles only made four of 12 foul shots in the first half.

Despite the big deficit, the girls continued to play hard in the second half. Colby's defense, the girls trademark this season, played tough, holding the Lady
