The Colby High Eagles' basketball team got off to a slow start this season, but the boys showed a lot of improvement as the yeat progressed.

The team finished their season with a 7-14 record.

The Eagles will be losing to some key players, including seniors Chaz Winger, Ryley Haas, Brock Wagoner and Braden McKee, Coach Jon McKee's son. Players with experience playing varsity like juniors Spencer Tubbs, Kale Arnberger and Corbin Stephens will have to adopt a leadership role next year for Colby to be successful.

Stephens averaged a team-high 11.4 per game. He had several big games this year, including scoring 19 on six-for-nine shooting in the Eagles' 56-47 victory over Oberlin on Feb. 5. He scored 17 in a 49-42 win against St. Francis and in the boys' 68-63 win against Hoxie on Jan. 15.

Stephens has a vast arsenal of moves on offense. He can knock down three-pointers, drain midrange jumpers off the dribble, score on dribble-drives to the basket and make reverse layups. He was also the team's second leading rebounder with a total of 100 rebounds.

McKee averaged 7.5 points per blocks with 41.
