Famous Hand

There are many bidding conventions a partnership may adopt which, when the right hand comes along, can prove very effective. Consider this deal from the 1970 world team championship match between Norway and the United States.

With Norway North-South, the bidding went as shown. The two-spade bid, as played by the Norwegian pair, indicated a hand with five hearts and either five diamonds or five clubs.

By using this convention, often called a Michaels cuebid, North was able to immediately paint a picture of his hand. South ultimately landed in five clubs, which he easily made, losing only two diamond tricks.

At the other table, with a U.S. pair now holding the North-South cards, the bidding went:

West	North	East	South
1 🛧	2 🎔	2 🛧	4 🎔
4 🛧	Pass	Pass	Dble

The Americans were not playing Michaels, so North overcalled at his first turn with two hearts. After East bid two spades, South jumped to four hearts, but he found himself faced with a difficult decision one round later when West bid four spades.

South elected to double, which did not turn out well when West lost only a spade, a heart and a club to make his contract. As a result, Norway gained 990 points on the deal, scoring 400 points at the first table and 590 points at the second table.

One can easily sympathize with the American South for choosing to double four spades instead of going on in hearts. He knew far less about North's hand than his opposite number at the first table, who had much more explicit information to lean on.
