

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Barry Kaaz, dean of external affairs at Colby Community College, reported to the college board at their meeting last week about placing a 2.5 kilowatt wind turbine on campus.

The turbine would be at the southwest corner of the campus, west of the Bedker Memorial Complex he said. and near Range Ave., Kaaz said at the meeting May 17 in Thomas Hall.

The college received a grant from the Wind for Schools Association at Kansas State University to

pay for the turbine, said Debbie Schwanke, public information director at the college. She said the turbine will produce power for an office, but also serve as a laboratory for students.

Kaaz said the turbine will be an "off-grid" system that will be used to help power an office cabin on campus. He said the cabin will also be powered by photovoltaic cells.

"We can market alternative energy at the college,"
